Study Questions

1). Heb 12:3 *For consider Him who endured such hostility from sinners against*

*Himself*, - What must we do as we 'consider' Jesus?

a). What are the 2 inseparable reasons why we must 'consider Him'?

b). What does 1 Peter Chapter 2 tell us about the way Christ endured suffering and what related scripture did we look at in connection with this?

c). What does Peter tell us about ourselves in these verses?

2). Read Hebrews 2:9-10, Hebrews 5:6-10 and Philippians 2:7-9 – What do these verses teach us about the purpose for Christ's sufferings and what do they teach us about that which was accomplished through His sufferings?

a). Which related scripture did we look at in connection with this and how is it all brought together in Hebrews Chapter 12?

b). What does Jesus have to say about us following His example?

c). What is the promise of scripture for us if we do follow His example?

3). Re-read Hebrews 2:10 – What does the word 'bringing' mean?

- a). What does this verse say 'was fitting for Him'?
  - b). What does the word 'captain' literally mean?
  - c). Which salvation is being spoken about and how would we know from the verse?
  - d). What should we understand about Him being 'the first to go'?
- 4). Read Hebrews 12:5-6 – What do these verses teach us?
- a). What is remarkable about that which we see in these verses?
  - b). Why did the Lord have to undergo 'child training'?
- 5). Read Matthew 3:16-4:1 – What is the sequence of events we see here?
- a). How is this fulfilling all righteousness?
  - b). What is presented through this sequence of events?
  - c). What does Jesus say to Nicodemus about this?
  - d). Where do we find this same sequence of events in foundation?
  - e). Read Romans 8:13-15 – what do these verses teach with regards to ourselves?
  - f). So what would be synonymous with the 'child training' from Hebrews Chapter 12?

6). What does Hebrews 12:5 tell us we are not to do with respect to the chastening of the Lord?

a). What does this word mean?

b). What does the word translated 'led' mean?

c). So, what does it mean to be 'led by the Spirit'?

d). What is it that the Holy Spirit brings forth?

e). Read James 1:21 – what is the first pre-requisite of 'child training'?

f). How is this confirmed for us in 2 Timothy and Titus?

g). So, once again, what would we need to say about our relationship with the Word of God?

h). Once the Holy Spirit has 'brought forth' the Word from above, what must come next?

i). How does James 1:22 describe this?

j). What additional commentary did we find in 1 Peter?

k). What then is the unalterable process for child training that God has established and what are our examples?

l). What does this mean for us?

7). Read Acts 7:22 – Why was Moses learned in all the wisdom of the Egyptians?

a). What does this teach us about our own child training?

b). What wisdom are we being trained in?

c). What connection would all this have in being transformed into the image of Christ?

8). Read Matthew 18:1-4 – What is taught in these verses?

a). What commentary do we find on this in 1 Peter Chapter 2 and Ephesians Chapter 4?

b). In which verses from Hebrews Chapter 12 do we find the same thing taught as in Matthew Chapter 18?

c). Read Hebrews 12:7-8 – how should we understand these verses?

d). What should we understand then about being a ‘son of God’ in the present?

e). Being ‘a son’ in this scriptural context is linked to adoption – where do we see this in Ephesians Chapter 1?

f). What does the word adoption mean? And what would adoption mean for us?

g). And so, how does God deal with every Christian during the course of their pilgrim journey? What is this dependent upon? Which scripture did we look at?
