- 1). 2Pe 3:8 ¶ But, beloved, do not forget this one thing, that with the Lord one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day.
 - a). In what way were Peter's original readers becoming like the scoffers?
- b). What warning do you take in this for yourself and what might you plan to do to counter 'forgetfulness'?
- 2). 2Pe 3:10 But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night, in which the heavens will pass away with a great noise, and the elements will melt with fervent heat; both the earth and the works that are in it will be burned up.
 - a). What event is this scripture describing and what is the time frame for it?
- b). What does 1 Corinthians 15:24-26 tell us about what will take place during the Millennial Kingdom?
 - c). What happens to Death and Hades according to Revelation Chapter 20?
- d). If there is no more Death and no more Hades what does this tell us about sin?
- e). If Death and Hades are not destroyed until the end of the Millennial Kingdom what does this tell you about sin during the Kingdom Age?

- f). What has been your impression of what life will be like on earth during the Kingdom?
- g). According to Revelation 20:2-3 what happens to Satan at the end of the Tribulation?
 - h). Is sin still possible if Satan is bound in the bottomless pit?
- 3). Ps 2:6 "Yet I have set My King On My holy hill of Zion."
- 7 ¶ "I will declare the decree: The LORD has said to Me, 'You are My Son, Today I have begotten You. 8 Ask of Me, and I will give You The nations for Your inheritance, And the ends of the earth for Your possession. 9 You shall break them with a rod of iron; You shall dash them to pieces like a potter's vessel."
 - a). What do these verses here from Psalm 2 tell us about the Kingdom Age?
- b). What verse is repeated as an overcomers' promise and what would this say to you about the Lord's joint heirs?
 - c). What does Psalm 110 tell us about the Kingdom Age?
 - d). Is this what you thought it would be?
- 4). Re 20:7 Now when the thousand years have expired, Satan will be released from his prison 8 and will go out to deceive the nations which are in the four corners of the earth,

- a). What happens to Satan at the end of the Millennial Kingdom?
- b). Once released what does he do?
- c). What is his purpose in doing this?
- d). In what way are the events surrounding Satan at the end of the Kingdom parallel to events at the end of the tribulation?
- e). What scriptures do we have that would describe the motivation behind his actions?
 - f). Why do you think this event is necessary?
 - g). What is God's response to Satan and the Gentile armies?
 - h). What then happens to Satan and who are already there in the same place?
 - i). What event follows Satan being cast into the lake of fire?
 - j). Who are the participants in this event?
 - k). What takes place next?
 - l). What does all of this provide the background for?
- 5). 2Pe 3:11 ¶ Therefore, since all these things will be dissolved, what manner of persons ought you to be in holy conduct and godliness,
 - a). What kind of question is being asked here?
 - b). Where have we already seen the answer to this question?

- c). How does this scripture challenge us with regards to our relationship with the world?
- d). Where does our focus need to be and how might we have certainty with respect to it?
- e). How does Ephesians 5:15-18 admonish us to conduct ourselves in the present?
 - f). What does the scripture from Hebrews Chapter 12 add to this?
 - g). What scriptures did we look at with regards to keeping a correct focus?
- 6). 2Pe 3:12 looking for and hastening the coming of the day of God,
 - a). What does it mean for us to be 'looking for' the day of God?
 - b). In what sense do we hasten its coming?
- 7). 2Pe 3:13 Nevertheless we, according to His promise, look for new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells.
- a). The scripture says that we look for a new heavens and earth, 'according to His promise' where is that promise?
- 8). 2Pe 3:14 Therefore, beloved, looking forward to these things, be diligent to be found by Him in peace, without spot and blameless;

- a). Where are we to look for these things?
- b). As we look forward what are we to do?
- c). What would it mean for us to be found by Him in peace and where would we find our example for this?
 - d). What is the only way then that we can be at peace with each other?
 - e). How would those 'in peace' be in contrast to the false teachers?
- f). What would it mean for us to be found by Him without spot and blameless and what scripture would we go to in order to help us with this?
- g). How would those 'without spot and blameless' be in contrast to the false teachers?
 - h). Whose work is this and what role do we play in it?
